Our Mission


The U.S. Department of Defense established the DoD/USU Brain Tissue Repository to advance traumatic brain injury (TBI) research.

Our Research

Our scientists compare injured and uninjured brain tissue to better understand the effects of TBI on brain health.

We have discovered a unique scarring pattern that may explain post-blast symptoms like headache, memory issues, sleep problems, and post-traumatic stress.


It is open to anyone 18 and older, who has served in the military (Reserves, Active, Veteran), with or without TBI, PTSD, or any other co-existing disorders.
